January 2022 Monthly Report

Oregon Elementary School

- Mrs. Stewart met with 30 students for individual meetings, facilitated 38 classroom lessons focused on kindness and problem solving, and facilitated 4 groups in Mrs. Costa's room with Mrs. Smith. Mrs. Stewart attended the following meetings: SAT meetings, staff meeting, student re-entry meeting, student services meeting, SEL cohort meetings, multiple parent meetings, and a student BSAT meeting. Mrs. Stewart also assisted with a student crisis call in which additional support was needed.
- Mrs. Stewart and Mr. Montanola have both been assisting in other areas of the building as needed due to staffing shortages.
- Mr. Montanola met with 30 students several times for individual counseling. He ran 18 social groups and 4 artful thinking groups. He also taught 17 SEL lessons. He has met on a regular basis with 77 students including groups. In addition, he provided 180 individualized student work classroom interventions. Furthermore, he met with three parents. He attended mandated meetings and assisted many times in the cafeteria during lunch period and outside at recess time.

David L. Rahn Junior High School

- Mrs. Cermak met with students to address social/emotional and academic concerns. Two peer mediation sessions were held in January.
- Worked with the OHS counselors to plan 9th grade course selection process for current 8th graders.
- Meetings this month included: department meetings, parent meetings, and several IEP meetings (DLR and OES).
- Mrs. Cermak also attended transition planning meetings during the month of January regarding the merger of the junior and senior high.
- During January staff shortages Mrs. Cermak provided coverage for classes and assisted in the DLR office.

Oregon High School

- Scheduling meetings and 2022-2023 course requests with juniors were completed during the month of January. During the month of February, counselors will travel to DLR to meet with 8th graders and continue with requests for current underclassmen.
- Counselors attended a virtual meeting about the Sauk Impact Program.
- The Whiteside Area Career Center presented to sophomore and junior classes on January 13th to share information about programs offered on their campus.
- Counselors met with students for academic and social-emotional assistance throughout the month of January.

SEL Interventionist

- @ DLR, Ms. Peterson continues her weekly groups with students
 - Boys lunch group- focusing on social skills and identifying emotions
 - Healthy Friendship group- consists of 4 female students from 7th and 8th grade
- @ DLR Ms. Peterson continues to do daily and weekly check-ins with students and supporting students on meeting personal goals that they have set (grades/attendance)
- @ DLR Ms. Peterson is in the process of connecting a couple students with some High School students for mentoring
- @ OHS Ms. Peterson continues to meet with students on weekly/bi-weekly basis to check-in and review goals/grades/emotions or any other needs the student may present
- @ OHS Ms. Peterson runs weekly BAT meetings addressing students who have been identified as needing some additional support.
- Ms. Peterson participated in an online training through the SEL Cohort regarding BIPs and FBAs

- The OCUSD 220/Ogle Co Education Cooperative (OCEC) Student Services Team for the District met on January 21, 2022. Updates on services and student situations were discussed.
- Counselors and Mrs. Mowry, the registrar, met to discuss programming offered to incoming 7th, 8th, and 9th grade classes and the course request process for the 2022-2023 school year.
