## Points of Interest:

Mrs. Kann and Ms.Murtaugh hosted a share-out session on student data binders and goal setting on December $1^{\text {st }}$; eleven teachers attended the optional opportunity. In this session, examples were provided to attendees of how the goal setting and data processes can be used in the classroom.

Mrs. Taylor, Mrs. Youngren, and Mrs. Wells led a sharing of their experience at this year's Illinois Reading Council conference. Mrs. Youngren shared information that she learned about developing students' vocabulary, which revolved around the book Word Nerds. Mrs. Wells and Mrs. Taylor shared strategies that they learned for engaging students in the reading process and ways to build their excitement.

A book exchange was held for students on December $2^{\text {nd }}$ and $3^{\text {rd }}$. This year, approximately 1,800 books were put into the hands of students through the exchange. The exchange was organized by Mrs. Hunter and Mrs. Mandi Callaway; a number of staff members assisted in the event in a variety of ways.

The first grade music program was held at OES on December $8^{\text {th }}$. Mrs. Donnelly led the first graders in the performance of a variety of holiday songs, centered on the book Mooseltoe.

On December $17^{\text {th }}$, Mr. Beske and Ms. Sheridan continued an annual tradition by hosting caroling in the Jefferson-wing gym. A number of classes came to listen to the festive music from the band and choir.

The 5th grade student leaders planned and held a pet supplies drive to raise items to Granny Rose animal shelter in Dixon. Students throughout the school brought in different pet-related goods over a two-week period. Mrs. Albrecht accompanied the group on a trip to the shelter on December $18^{\text {th }}$ to deliver the items that were amassed.

A family night was held at OES on December $15^{\text {th }}$.

- Christmas Around the World Night hosted by OES where families were able to make various crafts and have dinner together for a small price.
- Activities occurred in the cafeteria from 5-7 PM.
- Over 130 enjoyed the activities.
- The event was coordinated by Mrs. Albrecht, Mrs. Glendenning, Mrs. Kenney, and Mr. DeWilde.

The PBIS "boot camp" committee met in late December to plan the refresher assemblies that will be taking place during the first week of the second semester. The sixth grade student leader club provided a great deal of input into the planning of the refresher in conjunction with the committee. The refresher will be held January $8^{\text {th }}$.

## Grade level updates:

$3^{\text {rd }}$ - Students participated in a "Christmas around the world" activity where students engaged in a variety of learning activities with a Christmas theme.
$4^{\text {th }}$ - In December, fourth grade students spent time building their knowledge about main idea. They have been demonstrating knowledge through various (student selected) projects about U.S. national parks (brochures, power points, etc.). One example of fourth grade science comes from Ms. Murtaugh's room where students recently designed, developed, and built earthquake proof buildings. They had to justify their design decisions, test the reliability of the models and report on their findings. The fourth graders also helped spread Christmas cheer to both local nursing homes by singing songs, reading The Night Before Christmas, and handing out Christmas cards to the residents.

$6^{\text {th }}$ - The following are curricular highlights from sixth grade for December: Science-study of the Periodic Table and ph; Social Studies- students completed their independent studies Power Point (Prehistoric); Reading-students participated in reading circles of Island of the Blue Dolphins, Freak the Mighty, Where the Red Fern Grows, Maniac Magee, and Lightning Thief; and Math-students learned how to determine areas of shapes
