Social Entrepreneurship-Mr. Sitze

• The Social Entrepreneurship Student Startup Showcase, held on 12/6 at the Oregon Coliseum, was a successful culminating experience for the students' first semester. Besides a constant flow of parents, community leaders, businesspeople, and educators, the students secured \$640 of investment from 22 donors. More importantly, they made contacts with the community -- from advice, to partnership offers, to mentoring opportunities, the kids came away feeling the support of the community and the responsibility to take that support seriously. Next steps: reach out to investors, draw up agreements, and prepare for 3rd quarter's phase: launching the business!



Computer Programming-Code Quest 2017 Results-Mrs. Pattat

Code Quest 2017 has finished. There were over 5000 participants submitting a whopping 70,784 programs! It was a truly international competition, with students from more than 400 schools around the world participating, including Australia, the United States, New Zealand, Belgium, the United Kingdom, and the United Arab Emirates.

The certificate bands based on students' points as a percentage of the total points. There were 320 points in total for Beginners. The competition focused on learning a new coding language by using the new code and concepts in projects. Points were awarded for correctly completing projects with points deducted for bugs (errors). At each level the students needed to debug (fix) any errors before moving to the next level. The certificate bands were:

< 50% Participation 50-64% Merit 65-74% Credit 75-84% Distinction 85-99% High Distinction 100% Perfect Score

Out of the 17 OHS students who registered for this competition (and completed the projects on their own time outside of class), 8 were awarded certificates at the Merit level or higher. In fact, two of our students achieved a perfect score and one achieved High Distinction.

Boost Update-Mrs. Starkey

The semester has progressed quickly. It is encouraging to hear the students talking about final exams, rather than about winter break. We have moved into units on nutrition and consumer responsibility to end the semester in math, science, PE, and consumer ed. English has been working on a "scare" unit since October. The students have really embraced to the topic, and Mr. Zuber has been creative and flexible in responding to their interests. They are currently producing their own stories or movies. 3-D printing has also been of high interest in Mr. Nelson's room. Everyone has a product of which they are proud.

Mr. Zuber and Mr. Josh Nelson had a "man to man" talk with the boys about respect for women, themselves, and people who are different. These talks will continue throughout the year.

Upcoming projects focus on transition. Each student will move into a general education class next semester to recover a credit. Mrs. Starkey will be supporting them. Mr. Boyer will return to career talk in preparation for course selection planning for next year. It is our goal to have them on track to take WACC/dual-credit courses if desired. Two service projects are in the works. The group met with Mrs. Harvey last week to learn about her family's experiences with Ronald McDonald House. The group will be working to collect tabs for the program city-wide. Secondly, students will have the opportunity to do an independent day of service at off-campus sites of choice second semester. Mrs. Starkey is coordinating this project.

Students will be fundraising to pay for their nutrition unit projects and their upcoming service-vacation this winter. 2 concession dates have been scheduled. While we feel a little guilty after watching "Fed-up", our mini-store is flourishing.
