Re: Promotion Ceremony proposal

Proposal: This proposal recommends doing away with David L. Rahn's formal promotion

ceremony that is currently held each spring. This would not take effect until the

2018-2019 school year.

Rationale: As stated in some of the references below, this tradition has outlived its original

intent of graduating from the eighth being a milestone in many student's

educational careers. We did conduct an informal survey two years ago that was pretty much split 50/50 between the viewpoints of keep and no need to continue.

Testimonies: "The biggest factor in this decision would be regarding the class. If the students will be scattered due to having to attend a different school, I would say your hands are tied. However, as at my school, if they are advancing as a class I do not see the reason for hosting the event. We got rid of this tradition two years ago. We still hold an 8th grade awards day but it is very low key. Notification:

Should the decision to do away with promotion be made, notification to our current sixth grade class would be made prior to the start of next school year. As noted below, this was found to be important when researching this decision.

Alternative:

Other schools have addressed replacing their promotion ceremony by creating a daytime celebration; others have an evening award program. Again, if the decision is made to do away with promotion, a committee of parents will be formed to discuss further what the alternative plan will be to honor our eighth grade students here at DLR. My initial inclination is to create an evening award program. I believe this to be important in an effort to honor some of the more personal awards such as the "Miss Mal" and Terry O'Connor awards that are tied directly to a family having lost a child. Another initial thought would be to marry this award program to the parent sponsored eighth grade party and hold them both on the same evening.
