



- <u>I READ:</u>
  - First and second grade students have been meeting with their mentors since early September.
  - Kindergarten students will begin in October.
  - Lori Peterson, volunteer liaison, attended Open House to recruit volunteers. She has also met with various organizations and churches for recruiting.

# Special Education:

- Co-teaching team planning is to occur October 18<sup>th</sup>/19th.
- A training utilizing the updated web-based IEP system will occur at OES. Other districts within the co-op who have interested parties will participate as well. This will be done via phone conference.

# Response to Intervention (RtI):

• Benchmarking data meetings have occurred and identified students who are receiving Tier 2 and Tier 3 interventions in the areas of reading, math and behavior.

# Summer Book Club:

- Students who are considered "at-risk" readers are asked to participate in the summer book club.
- Students are given eight books, one per week, over the summer. They are asked to write and send a stamped postcard to the teacher who oversees that grade level in the program.
